### **TOWN BUDGET**

The Annual Operating Budget for the Town is one of the most important policy documents adopted by the Town Board that ensures the appropriate funding and operations of all of the services you've come to expect. Quarterly Town staff review budget-to-actuals of the current year and recommend updates via resolutions as-needed to ensure accuracy of these numbers. Halfway through the year, major public works projects are determined and approved by the Town Board, which consists of the bulk of collected dollars - these projects improve our streets, ditches, culverts, and bridges. At the end of Summer, the Town Chairman and Town Clerk work closely together to create a draft of the next year's budget taking into consideration what was spent during the current vear and upcoming goals and projects for the next. This draft budget is then reviewed over multiple monthly Town Board meetings leading up to the Town Electors meeting (typically in November) where the public are able to voice their opinion and vote on the amount of taxes to be collected. before the final budget is officially adopted by the Town Board. This entire process is documented via various agendas and public notices that are required to be posted and available. This year's tax rate remains flat from the prior year at ~\$3.30 per \$1,000 of assessed value. If you ever have any questions about the operating budget, or wish to make suggestions for the future, please contact our Town Office. At the end of the day, this is your town and your hard-earned tax dollars at work!

## FROM THE FIRE CHIEF

As winter months approach us and days and nights are becoming colder, it can be quite inviting to light a fire in the fireplace to take the chill out. But before lighting it for the season it may be a good idea to have it, and the chimney, inspected. Also make sure to cover the opening of the fireplace with a screen to help prevent sparks from flying out and possibly starting a fire. Keep at least three feet of clearance around the fireplace, including preventing children and pets from sitting too close. Toys and other potentially flammable materials should also be kept away from this area as well.

Cooking fires tend to increase this time of year. There are a few steps you can take to be fire safe in the kitchen. First and foremost, never leave cooking unattended. Simply stated – when cooking, stay in the kitchen. It's also a good idea to keep a fire extinguisher close by, but if you don't have one handily available, there are other means of dousing a fire in the kitchen. For small grease fires on the stove, instead of water, use a lid or wet towel to cover the pot or pan, leaving them in place until the pot cools completely. If a fire occurs in the oven, first turn it off and make sure to close the door. In either case call 911 to have the fire department come out and take a look. If the fire seems out of hand then it probably is, so leave the house immediately closing the door behind you. Closing the door helps limit the amount of air to fuel the fire, hopefully containing it until help arrives. A few more tips to consider when cooking; be sure to keep oven mitts, towels, wooden utensils and food packaging away from the stove top; keep young children away from hot surfaces; and most important, don't leave cooking unattended.

Remember, calling 911 in an emergency is not always the responsibility of an adult. Make sure every member of your household has the knowledge to call if needed.
